The Museum's **Annual Dinner** takes place Friday, April 28, at 6:00 PM, in the *M. "Jack" Bell Hall* of the *Mary H. Herron Community Conference Center.* The night includes a sneak preview of newly created and/or renovated spaces, including the new collections storage area and the relocated *Mary Bratton Curtis Gallery.* The event is for current supporters, community leaders and

friends of the Museum. RSVP by April 24, 2017.

After considerable discussion, it has been decided that renting Museum facilities, including the *Mary H. Herron Conference Center*, will be limited to corporate and organizational events. We do not want to compete with new commercial enterprises in the community that offer banquet room and catering venues. However, we will continue our *Affiliates Program*, which offers non-profit and service organizations preferential rates for use of the facilities.

Supplier-led delays have caused us to rethink our construction schedule. Regardless, we plan to have all interiors completed, and available, by the end of summer. This will include our cast of the Oklahoma State Dinosaur *Acrocanthosaurus*, which will be back on display in time for Fall visits from school groups. 

As Culturas Amazonas (October 17 - January 14, 2018)



The Museum of the Red River is the largest exhibiting facility within a 150 mile radius, providing both learning opportunities and aesthetic experiences to its audiences. Through its exhibits and public educational programs, it offers unprecedented access to some of the finest cultural artifacts in the nation, representing native American groups and others from around the world. Its three Student, Public Reference, and Research libraries offer over 5000 volumes and printed materials illustrating cultural history. The Holland and Sallie Webb Family Learning Center provides hands-on, interactive experiences for students of all ages. The Museum is open 10 AM to 5 PM Tuesday through Saturday and 1 PM to 5 PM on Sunday. Closed Mondays and national holidays. **Admission is free.**

Off-site displays are installed at four regional libraries (Idabel, Broken Bow, Valliant, and Hugo), Southeastern Oklahoma State University's McCurtain County Campus, the Oklahoma Forest Heritage Center and the Kiamichi Family Medical Center.

The Museum's budget is supported by investment income, earned income, and the ongoing support of individuals, families, corporations and foundations. It neither solicits nor accepts government funding. Additionally, it works in cooperation with other arts and cultural agencies to provide activities and events to the public.
